

Ash Wednesday Worship February 14 at 6 pm in the Sanctuary

Ash Wednesday is a Christian holiday (holy day) that has been honored for well over ten centuries. It marks the beginning of Lent, the 6-week period leading up to Easter, when many Christians prepare for Easter by observing a period of fasting, repentance, moderation or other spiritual practices. Our worship on Ash Wednesday will introduce our Lenten Theme: Learning to Lament and will include the ancient Christian practice of the imposition of ashes on the forehead or wrist. The use of ashes is a visible symbol of repentance, which signifies the purification and sorrow for sins.





God desires for us to pour out our hearts in joy and in pain. Scripture is full of examples of lament, expressions of anger, frustration and sadness at God and the injustice of life, like Psalm 22 which says, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" In our culture, which often denies pain, it is essential that we reclaim the spiritual practice of lament. Join us for worship this Lent, as we explore Lament.

Practicing Lament over Comfort Food Sunday, March 18 at 5:00 pm

We will gather on Sunday, March 18 at 5:00 pm in the Fellowship Hall to share a potluck meal. We are asking you to bring a "comfort food" to share. It could be a food associated with the security of childhood like Mom's chicken soup or an indulgence food like ice cream.

Recently, Michael and I were talking about this event, Practicing Lament over Comfort Food, when my son Nate chimed in and said, "My comfort food is chicken and dumplings." He is 8; I didn't think he knew about comfort food. I was touched that he chose a food that my grandmother, who recently passed away, taught us to make.

Visioning Process for First Baptist

I wanted to give you an update on our visioning process. As you know, due to a tragedy in the life of our church, we decided to postpone the visioning events which were scheduled for the first of February. This week, I have

been in contact with Dr. Chris Gambil at the Center for Congregational Health to talk about rescheduling those events. We discussed the possibility of holding the visioning events after Easter. However, participating in the visioning events is only one step in the process. After the events, the visioning team would be tasked with collecting all the information, stories, and data from the events, sifting through all of it looking for themes. Then, they would distill that information down to focus statements, which will guide our life together as a church for the next few years, and report back to the church. After looking at the calendar, we realized that it would rush the visioning team to gather all the data and work through it before summer. By fall, the information would be cold/old. Consequently, we have made the decision to



postpone the visioning events to the fall. There is nothing pressing that we need to talk about. We are in a good place as a congregation. I believe that we can come back to the visioning process in the fall, rested and ready to do the work together. Thank you for your understanding and support.

Possible First Baptist Trip July 6- 12 Lakota Reservation- Bridger, South Dakota

First Baptist has been invited to return to the Lakota Reservation in Bridger again this summer.

There is no big project scheduled for this year, so the trip will mainly be focused on building and maintaining relationships within the reservation and possibly some light construction work, clean up, and help with maintenance needs at the Takini School. We need at least 10 people to make the trip but can take up to 20. We will also need people willing to cook this year, as we will not be teaming with Second Baptist in Liberty for this trip. The cost of the trip is expected to remain at \$100 per person.

As a reminder, when we stay in Bridger we sleep at the church. Participants are asked to bring their own air mattresses and bedding. There are showers and restrooms on site.
