Constantly consumed with my to-do lists, tasks to accomplish, and gold stars to earn, I often reach the end of the day and wonder where the time went. This drive, in and of itself isn't a bad thing. I love making to-do lists and I love the feeling of a job well done. But, if I'm not careful, I will buy in to the message that I am what I do.

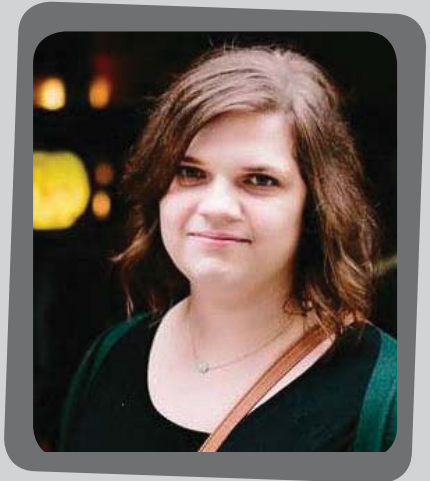
Because of this, I have leaned into spiritual practices that push against my desire to be a human doing and challenge me to be a human being. I have found that centering prayer and mindfulness practices are essential to my spiritual wellbeing. Sitting in stillness and doing nothing, even if just for a few moments, brings me back into the present moment and away from planning and accomplishing. These spiritual practices remind me that I am more than what I do.

In the past, the season leading up to Christmas is often when I fall the hardest into doing-mode. Perhaps it is my final push to reach my end of the year goals or maybe it is the consumer-driven culture that is in overdrive leading up to Christmas. But, whatever the cause, the month of December often feels frantic. There are, of course, gifts to be bought, trips to be planned, parties to attend, and on and on it goes. 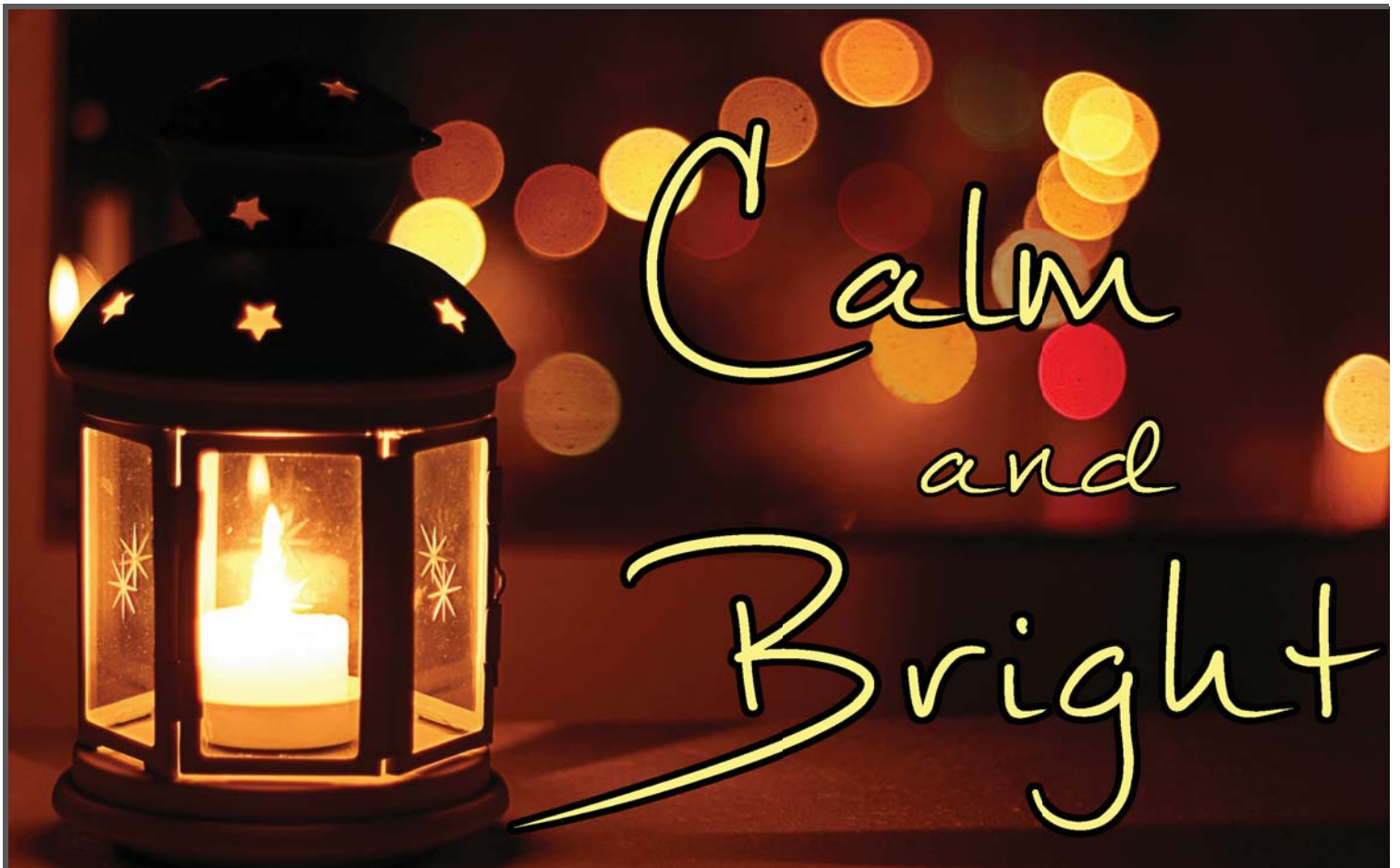

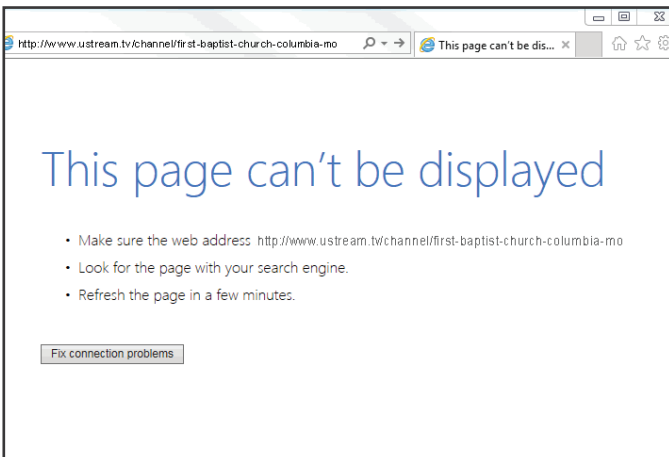




Quarterly Financial Update

As we look forward at the future of First Baptist, it is important to think about how we will continue to provide the tools and resources needed to accomplish the opportunities before us. Your gifts help fund our mission's efforts, church ministries, staff salaries, and our beautiful facilities. Through the end of September, we have received about \$247,000 in pledged and unpledged gifts (we budgeted to be at \$273,000). While our pledged giving is on target for the year, our unpledged gifts have fallen behind what was expected, leaving a larger deficit to reach our budget goal of \$364,200 for 2018. On top of this, the church has incurred some unbudgeted financial responsibilities due to changes in tax liabilities and budgeting that have added around \$23,000 to our projected expenses. We are still hopeful to reach our goals between now and the end of the year, but we need your help. Maybe you are able to increase or catch up on your pledge. Maybe you didn't pledge last year but are able to give a little more to help with these needs. Your gifts, prayers, and support are greatly appreciated. As we continue to realize the amazing ministry opportunities, we have discussed in our Visioning process, please consider what you can give now to ensure a continued bright future for First Baptist. Traditional Service Webcast to Return November 18

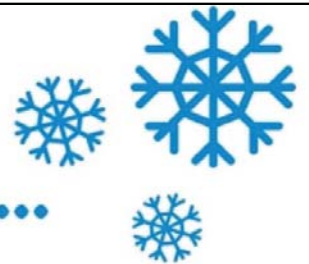

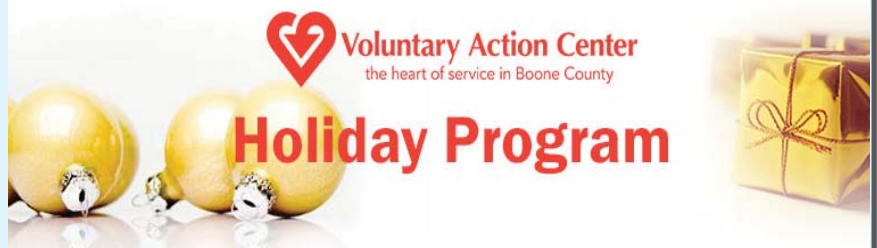
\$2,027 for Hurricane Relief from First Baptist

VAC Family Christmas

First Baptist is sponsoring 3 families this year through VAC's Holiday Program. Voluntary Action Center (VAC) is a non-profit that exists to help low-income individuals and families bridge the gap

between crisis and stability and improve quality of life in Boone County. Each year VAC coordinates the collection and distribution of food and gifts for approximately 4,000 people during the holiday season. First Baptist is participating once again in this needed ministry. In addition to toys, books, and games, families often receive needed clothing and household supplies through this program. Cards with individual gift requests will be available Sunday November 18 on the bulletin board, in the hallway, outside the Sanctuary. Get involved by choosing an item that you would like to donate, take the card, then return the purchased item to the church by December 9. Items do not need to be wrapped but we do ask that you include the card from the bulletin board with your gift. We will also accept monetary donations to go towards gifts.
