Administration Update



Since stepping into the Interim Administrative role in July, I have been amazed at the dedication and work of all of our Administrative teams. These teams include: Trustees, Finance, Personnel, and Endowment. The chairs and members of these teams have been incredible in helping me understand the detailed work that goes on behind the scenes to keep our facilities working properly and our ministries running smoothly. As such, I wanted to take the opportunity to shine a light on some of these projects for the broader congregation to see.

One of the recurring compliments I get from people who visit our church is how beautiful and well maintained it is inside and out. Several

volunteers give countless hours of their time to help with this effort. I am grateful for them and for our Project Coordinator, Brenda Rice, and

custodian Mike Ide, who work daily to create an atmosphere of welcome and cheer. Our Trustees often tackle the larger tasks involved with this area. This year alone they have been responsible for overseeing the update of our gutters and downspouts, the renovations of the bathrooms at the back of the sanctuary, replacing the front steps of the church, working on repairs to the front doors of the sanctuary, and maintaining the various trees on the property, along with many other routine tasks.

Yet, even with all of their planning and work, in a facility of this size and age, there are always some unexpected curveballs that come along. As many of you know, in March of this year we discovered a significant problem with the main sanitary line that runs under the Fellowship Hall, 14 feet 5 inches under the Fellowship Hall to be exact. The line, installed in 1927, has failed. We cannot simply dig up the line and repair it because of its depth and proximity to the main support pillars inside the church. The Trustees have worked hard in the past several months with Coil Construction and QuesTec Mechanical to find the best solution to this very difficult problem. The scope and complexity of the project resulted in an initial proposal that exceeded \$145,000 in unbudgeted expenses. Through several meetings and much deliberation, we have been able to determine what parts of the project must be completed immediately and what parts can be phased in over the next few years. The work on this project will begin soon with more details to come.

In addition to this work, First Baptist had to replace one of our boilers in September. The last of the three old boilers for the Sanctuary finally expired. We would not be able to adequately heat the facility this winter without a replacement. The good folks at Air Systems were able to remove the old boilers and install a new, high efficiency boiler to take their place. This system should ensure we stay warm this winter. While we knew this expense was coming, we had not yet set aside enough money to cover this entire cost. The Trustees and the Finance Committee have worked diligently to find the best way forward with our current resources. This has included allocating what budget



money is available, requesting funds from some of our appropriate endowments, postponing other pressing projects (such as the resurfacing of the parking lot), and exploring possible solutions for the near future.

I say all of this not to highlight the difficulties and struggles we face, but to celebrate the dedicated people who rise to each of these demands, and applaud the hard work they continue to offer to our church family. Each of us have a part in the work and ministry that happens in this place. Together, and with God's guidance, we can meet any challenge that comes our way. I look forward to serving alongside our Administrative Team as we move forward, and I hope you will help as we work to continue the good work that God is doing in this place.
