Room at the Inn is a ministry of Columbia Interfaith Resource Center (or CIRC), one of our ministry partners. Although Room at the Inn is winding down, the mission of CIRC continues. Their strategy is to be "a place where homeless, near-homeless and at-risk persons are provided support and resources in a loving and dignified manner to not only comfort and sustain them in a moment of need but also to provide services which will help move them toward a safe, sustainable and self-sufficient life." the Interfaith Day Center, also works to address these needs. Turning Point operates out of Wilkes Boulevard United Methodist Church, which converted its third floor to house the ministry until a more permanent location is available. Turning Point Ministries offers shower and laundry facilities, phones, computer access, places to store documents, and information on employment and volunteering opportunities and housing options. Wilkes Boulevard Pastor, Rev. Meg Hegemann, has said that the ministry is designed to help build confidence in those who seek out its services and demonstrate that there are places

What I have experienced has not only been a pleasant surprise, but an impressive demonstration of service and leadership that often goes unnoticed.

When we talk about Room at the Inn, much of our focus is either on the need for volunteers, or the people who benefit from the shelter.
