# Mark your calendars on September 23-25; First Baptist to offer the SAFE seminar!

I have been thinking a lot about sex. Allow me to explain. It all started last fall when a friend of mine who is a children's minister called to tell me that her church had discovered that a deacon in their leadership had been abusing children for years right under their noses. Then, in the spring, when Michael and I adopted our daughter, Marin, our 6-year-old began asking lots of questions about where babies come from. I wanted to say, "the stork brings them," but I knew that was an insufficient answer. Finally, in the last few years, it seems like the horror stories of rape on college campuses have continued to pile up; the Stanford swimmer is just the latest in a long line of violent acts committed against women.

All of this has been a wake-up call for me as a parent and a pastor about how important it is for us to talk about sex with our children. It is essential that parents be equipped to be the primary sex educators of their children and it is

absolutely crucial that we as a church work tirelessly to create a safe place for children. We have to do everything in our power to protect the children in our care. In addition, as followers of Christ we have a unique worldview regarding sex. We see it as a gift from God, something sacred and mysterious; so, how do we convey this worldview to our children?

As a result of all of this, in partnership with our Child Development Center, First Baptist is going to offer SAFE (Sexual Awareness and Family Empowerment Seminar). LeAnn Gardner, who is an ordained minister and clinical social worker, will be with us September 23-25 to discuss how parents become the primary transmitters of information about sex and safety to our children. We will discuss the many facets of child safety, including education about sexual development and sex education; teaching body awareness and empowerment to our children; and eliciting a strong



supportive adult network to help us with this heavy responsibility of keeping our children safe. This seminar is for parents of young children, grandparents, people who volunteer in our preschool and children's ministry, and any adult who wants to be educated about how to keep our children safe.

**What:** New Summer Small Group offering - Looking for a Village - Reshaping the Church's Response to the Faith Journey of Young People.

**When:** Sunday mornings 10:15 - 11:05 a.m., June 19th - August 7th. This summer series will last for 8 weeks and is designed to accommodate busy summer schedules. We know many of our congregation will be in and out of town often this summer, but we hope you will join us when you can.

Where: Second floor in the Parlor.

**Who it's for:** Adults 18 and up. This is a vital topic for everyone in our faith community. We are looking for a healthy intergenerational mix to join in this discussion to better represent our congregation.

What we'll discuss: In some ways this is an intervention. It has become abundantly clear that the church is losing its appeal to the younger generation (and many in the other



generations if we are honest). The attempt of this discussion is to help us as a church understand why this is happening and better equip ourselves to live out the beauty and passion of the Gospel in a way that is authentic and attractive to those ground us

#### Over the summer we will:

- Paint of broad picture of how the church has attempted to minister to children and youth through the centuries.
- Look at some of the social and cultural developments that have influenced how we raise kids and brought us to where we are today.
- Explore the difficult discussion of growing childhood pressure/stress and the expanse of adolescence that has created a sense of abandonment in our young people.
- Identify how the church has responded (or not responded) to all of these changing needs.
- Determine and discuss a model that will help us frame a
  discussion of how to move forward and change the status
  quo by equipping our membership to better understand
  and articulate their faith, establish a shared response to
  what we have learned and adjust our approach to ministry
  with our kids, youth and young adults.

I realize that is a lofty set of goals for an 8-week small group offering, but what can I say, I am an optimist. My hope is that this series will offer a rich experience in both the theoretical and the practical. It will consist of loads of information and opportunities for digestion and reflection through group discussion and optional outside resources. In the end, I hope it will leave us with some good steps to better share the best of our faith with the generations to come. What is abundantly clear to me is that we cannot afford to do nothing, so I hope you will come and join us this summer as we seek to create a better village of faith in which to raise incredible followers of Christ.
