


Holy Humor Sunday

From the Pastor

This summer, I will be going on Sabbatical, beginning May 28. The covenant that I have with the church provides a sabbatical after five years of service. During my sabbatical, I will be fully disengaging from my responsibilities at the church. But don't worry, the church will be in good hands. Our Associate Pastors, Ed Rollins and Michael McEntyre, and our Pastoral Resident, Brittany McDonald Null will take care of all day-to-day tasks that I normally do. In addition, Rev. Brian Ford, a regular attender in Awakening Worship, will be on hand to help as needed. I have already scheduled a group of talented preachers to fill in on Sundays that I will be away. In addition, part of our Pastoral Residency program curriculum is to ask our Resident to preach a series of sermons over a 3-week period to allow them to experience the demands of weekly sermon writing on top of regular pastoral duties. My sabbatical is a great opportunity for Brittany McDonald Null to meet this requirement.



WHAT IS A SABBATICAL?

The word 'sabbatical' has its roots in the biblical concept of Sabbath, which means to cease or rest. Sabbatical leave is a time when the pastor is granted leave away from the normal responsibilities of church in order to rest, reflect and spend time in spiritual renewal. The Louisville Institute has done some research on the effectiveness of sabbaticals. You will be happy to know that eighty percent of pastors who received one of their sabbatical grants report that their sabbatical refreshed or re-energized them to a 'great extent.' Ninety-four percent of Congregational Representatives indicate that they perceived their pastor to have been refreshed or re-energized after the sabbatical. In addition, seventy five percent of congregations reported that the sabbatical tangibly benefited the life of the church. A sabbatical is beneficial to the longevity and health of pastors and to the congregation under their care.

WHAT WILL I BE DOING?

My sabbatical plan includes a couple of weeks of travel for fun and connecting with my family. Michael and I will celebrate our 20th Anniversary in Costa Rica, and visit our family in Tennessee. I am taking some intentional time for spiritual renewal and growth. So, I am going to attend the Wild Goose Festival, a gathering of progressive Christians that meets in rural Hot Springs N.C., where I will be attending lectures and glamping for 5 days. I can't wait! The rest of my sabbatical will be spent resting and working on finishing my Doctor of Ministry (DMin). As most of you know, I have finished my course work at Drew University and have completed my DMin project. But each week, I spend about ten hours studying and writing my sermon. This takes a lot of creative energy. When the sermon is done, it is hard for me to write anything else. Hopefully, during my sabbatical I can channel that creative energy into writing my dissertation!

I want you to know how grateful I am for First Baptist and for the gift of a sabbatical. I appreciate how well you care for your pastoral staff. Thank you.

HOW CAN YOU HELP WHILE I AM AWAY?

- Come to worship regularly and faithfully just like you would if I was here.
- Pray for me and for my family. Pray for me to get some rest, for my spirit to be renewed and for me to get substantial work done on my dissertation.
- Read Wayne Mueller's book Sabbath (copies are \$10, and will be available next Sunday before and after worship). Be prepared to talk about it when I return.
- Find ways to work some Sabbath rest into your own life this summer.

The Practice of Sabbath


This summer while I am away on Sabbatical, I want to invite you to reflect on and enter into the spiritual practice of Sabbath with me and hopefully, experience rest and renewal in your own life. Years ago, I read Wayne Muller's book called Sabbath. Here is a synopsis:

In today's world, with its relentless emphasis on success and productivity, we have lost the necessary rhythm of life, the balance between work and rest. Constantly striving, we feel exhausted and deprived in the midst of great abundance. We long for time with friends and family, we long for a moment to ourselves.

Millennia ago, the tradition of Sabbath created an oasis of sacred time within a life of unceasing labor. Now, in a book that can heal our harried lives, Wayne Muller shows us how to create a special time of rest, delight, and renewal - a refuge for our souls.

Muller is an ordained Christian minister but the book draws on wisdom from multiple faith traditions. It is filled with wonderful stories, poems, and suggestions for practice. Muller teaches us how we can use this time of sacred rest to refresh our bodies and minds and restore our souls. At the end of chapters on rest, rhythm, time, happiness, wisdom, and consecration, Muller includes dozens of Sabbath exercises such as taking a guilt-free nap, blessing your children, keeping a Sabbath box, creating a family altar, and thinning or letting go of possessions.

He writes, "Sabbath time can be a revolutionary challenge to the violence of overwork, mindless accumulation, and the endless multiplication of desires, responsibilities, and accomplishments. Sabbath is a way of being in time where we remember who we are, remember what we know, and taste the gifts of spirit and eternity." Sabbath is a beautifully written book; give yourself a gift this summer and read it! Books are available for purchase (\$10 each) Monday-Friday in the church office or on Sunday mornings in the hallway outside the Sanctuary.



ForColumbia Day of Service April 28


