Gospel Reading

John 12:9-19

When the great crowd of the Jews learned that he was there, they came not only because of Jesus but also to see Lazarus, whom Jesus had raised from the dead. So the chief priests planned to put Lazarus to death as well, since it was on account of him that many of the Jews were deserting and were believing in Jesus.

The next day the great crowd that had come to the festival heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, shouting,

“Hosanna!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord—
the King of Israel!”

Jesus found a young donkey and sat on it; as it is written:

“Do not be afraid, daughter of Zion.

Look, your king is coming,
sitting on a donkey’s colt!”

His disciples did not understand these things at first; but when Jesus was glorified, then they remembered that these things had been written of him and had been done to him. So the crowd that had been with him when he called Lazarus out of the tomb and raised him from the dead continued to testify. It was also because they heard that he had performed this sign that the crowd went to meet him. The Pharisees then said to one another, “You see, you can do nothing. Look, the world has gone after him!”

Flowering the Cross - A Declaration of Hope on Easter Morning

On Easter, we often celebrate by covering our cross with colorful flowers or ribbons. While we will not be able to do this as a community this year, Brenda will be covering our cross on our front lawn with flowers and we want to encourage you to create your own cross to beautify. First, during Holy Week, make a cross. It can be out of popsicle sticks, twigs, or even paper! Then on Easter morning, cover the cross with flowers. They can be flowers from your garden, flowers made from paper, or even flowers drawn right on the cross. The method isn't important, this is an act of hope, a declaration that God can and will make beautiful things out of grief and the cross.
