New Sermon Series – July 5

On Sunday, July 5 we are beginning a new sermon series on Compassion. The sermon series coincides with Compassion Camp, our virtual, at-home children's ministry VBS or Kids Camp for the summer where kids and their families are exploring what it means to have compassion for others, ourselves, and the world.

Compassion Camp utilizes a very simple definition of compassion: I see your hurt, I feel your hurt with you and I'll work to ease your hurt. It is a reminder that compassion is rooted in a Latin word meaning "co-suffering." Compassion is seeing someone who is hurting and practicing empathy. However, we know that as followers of Jesus, empathy is not enough. Compassion, rooted in the good news of Jesus Christ must move us toward action, toward alleviating suffering. The Bible does not just call us to believe in the faith, but to act on it. We are all sent by Jesus into the world to work for the good of the world. Throughout this series, we will be exploring different places in our lives where we might cultivate compassion.

The scripture passages that we will be utilizing in worship each week are also the passages being used by Compassion Camp. If you want read them ahead of time, here they are:

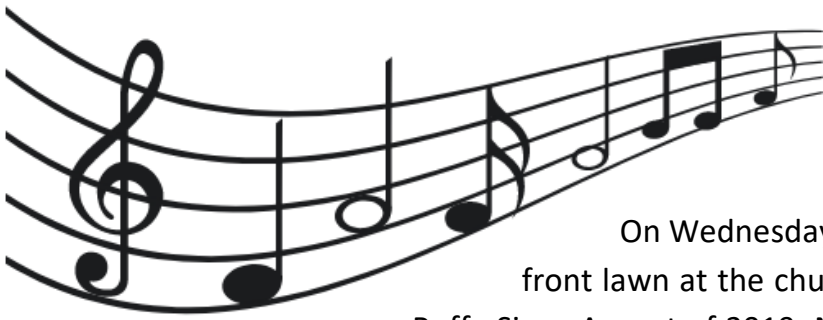


Compassion Camp Drive-Thru Launch Party

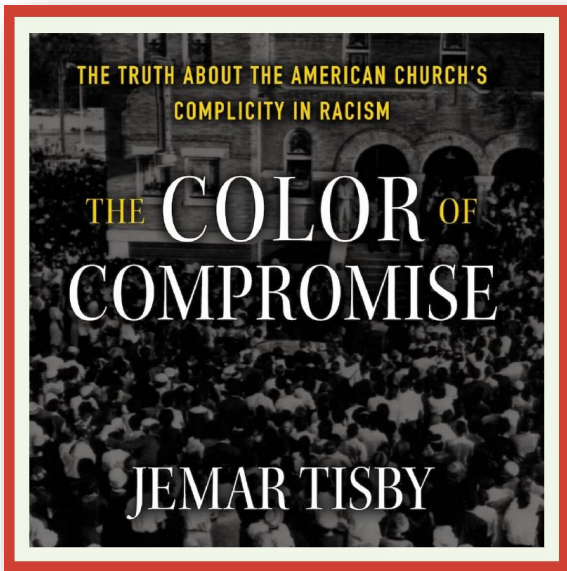

First Baptist Book Club – August 2020

First Baptist's Book Club has selected *I'm Still Here: Black Dignity in a World Made for Whiteness* by Austin Channing Brown. Austin is an activist, a writer, a speaker, and a media producer providing inspired leadership on racial justice in America. In *I'm Still Here*, Brown offers an eye-opening account of growing up Black, Christian, and female that exposes how white America's love affair with "diversity" so often falls short of its ideals. In order to give time for people to purchase and read the book, the next Book Club meeting will take place in August!



The Color of Compromise Study Expands and Resumes

Prior to the Covid-19 pandemic, a small group was meeting to talk about *The Color of Compromise* a book and video study by Jemar Tisby, which takes readers on a historical journey: from America's early colonial days through slavery and the Civil War, covering the tragedy of Jim Crow laws and the victories of the Civil Rights era, to today's Black Lives Matter movement. Author Jemar Tisby reveals the obvious—and the far more subtle—ways the American church has compromised what the Bible teaches about human dignity and equality.

Tisby uncovers the roots of sustained injustice in the American church, highlighting the cultural and institutional tables that need to be turned in order to bring about real and lasting progress between black and white people. Through a story-driven survey of American Christianity's racial past, he exposes the concrete and chilling ways people of faith have actively worked against racial justice, as well as the deafening silence of the white evangelical majority. Tisby shows that while there has been progress in fighting racism, historically the majority of the American church has failed to speak out against this evil. This ongoing complicity is a stain upon the church, and sadly, it continues today. Tisby does more than diagnose the problem, however. He charts a path forward with intriguing ideas that further the conversation as he challenges us to reverse these patterns and systems of complicity with bold, courageous, and immediate action. *The Color of Compromise* provides an accurate diagnosis for a racially divided American church and suggests creative ways to foster a more equitable and inclusive environment among God's people.

The group lead by Lynne Lampe and Julie Walker are planning to restart their discussion of *The Color of Compromise* in August via Zoom. They are also planning to do some research on racism in Columbia and First Baptist's response throughout the years. If you would like to join the discussion, purchase the book on your own, begin reading, then email Lynne at llampe.editor@gmail.com. To allow for maximum participation, the group is not planning to meet during Sunday Morning Small Group hour and will pick another day and time for the four sessions, to be determined by those who choose to participate.

- Session 1: Chapters 1-2 (Group introductions, book intro, Colonial Era)
- Session 2: Chapters 3-5 (Age of Revolution and Revival, Antebellum Era, Civil War)
- Session 3: Chapters 6-8 (Jim Crow, Northern Complicity, Civil Rights Movement)
- Session 4: Chapters 9-11 ("Religious right" , Racial Reconciliation, Black Lives Matter, Courage in the "Age of Now")

When?

Saturday, August 1, beginning at 9:00am. Lunch will be provided.

What can I expect?

A group of less than 50 volunteers divided up into smaller teams and distanced around the property will be working outside to help the school install an outside classroom! This work will include:

- moving some fencing and installing new sections;
- spreading mulch in a large area that will include several new “play elements” for this outdoor classroom;
- painting some of the play elements of the outdoor classroom;
- general yard clean-up of the property.

What should I bring?

ForColumbia will provide all painting supplies, tools and plants necessary for this project.

- Volunteers are asked to bring masks to be worn at the work site.
- Volunteers are encouraged to bring their own leaf rakes to assist with yard clean-up and pitch forks and garden rakes for spreading mulch, as well as work gloves.
- We encourage all volunteers to wear closed-toe shoes, as well as clothing you are comfortable painting in.
- Be prepared for a sunny day by bringing sunscreen and/or a hat.
