Palm Sunday - April 14

Palm Sunday is a joyous day at First Baptist! Children are invited to take part in a Palm Sunday processional at the beginning of both Awakening (9:15 am) and Traditional (11:15 am) worship; parents, please bring your children to the back of the worship space a few minutes before worship, so they can receive a palm leaf and join the processional.

First Baptist will also participate in the Downtown Palm Sunday Service in conjunction with other area churches. This special service takes place in the middle of the street on Broadway. We will meet on the front lawn at 10:20 am and walk downtown together.

Good Friday - April 19

Friday: the day the world turned dark and all hope was lost - the day of death. On Good Friday, we will gather at 6:00 pm in the Fellowship Hall to join the lament of those who follow Christ. It is a final moment of preparation prior to the joy of Easter.

Easter Egg Hunt – April 20

The Easter Egg Hunt will take place for toddlers up to 5th Graders at First Baptist Church on Saturday, April 20 at 10:00 am. There will be games, crafts, treats, and please bring your own baskets for the Egg Hunt!

Easter Sunday- April 21

Easter morning begins with a celebration of the Resurrection at the 9:15 am Awakening Contemporary Worship Service in the Fellowship Hall. Everyone is invited to enjoy pastries and beverages from 10:15 am to 11:15 am. Traditional Worship will celebrate the Risen Christ at 11:15 am in the Sanctuary.

ForColumbia Sign Up

April 27

Sign-ups are open now through April 15 to volunteer with ForColumbia. The day of service takes place on Saturday April 27. There are morning and afternoon time slots available. ForColumbia is a city-wide day of service that brings together churches in Columbia to be the hands and feet of Christ in our community. You can register through the church website or at www.forcolumbia.com/volunteer/.

First Baptist will be leading sites at Hickman High School (working outside with landscaping and painting, some light painting projects inside, and building storage shelves for athletics), Benton Elementary (working to restore 2 greenhouses to working form by creating a ground cover to block weeds, restructuring shelving to better suit needs, and creating an innovative watering system), and serving as a prayer hub here at the church for projects and prayer requests that are happening the day of the event. We also have a family friendly site at Memorial Baptist helping to prepare freezer meals to supply to area ministries in need. To register for one of these projects specifically, fill in the registration information on the volunteer page and in the Comments section at the bottom indicate the site you wish to specifically sign up for. If you need help registering, there will be people to assist you after the services on April 7 and 14.

Know that First Baptist volunteers are not limited to one of these sites. Currently there are 64 unique ministry opportunities around the city you could participate in that day. You can find out more about these sites on the ForColumbia webpage. You can list your skills and preferences on the registration page and ForColumbia can place you where you are most needed. We hope you will make plans to join this city-wide day of service on April 27.

Models of Atonement

Christus Victor (Victory Model): When humanity sinned, we became captive to evil (such as sin, death or Satan). When Jesus died, it looked like evil won, but with the resurrection Jesus defeated the power of sin and death and evil.

Satisfaction (Payment Model): God's holiness and justice demands that debt of sin be paid. Jesus' death pays the price for human sin.

Moral Influence Model:

The Moral Influence Model says that when we look at Jesus' life and death, we see the greatness of divine love. As a result, this delivers us from fear and kindles in us an answering love. It calls on us to respond. It is a catalyst that propels us toward goodness, love, justice, and generosity. Through Jesus' example and the power of the Holy Spirit, transformation happens - of human beings, and then of the world.

Scapegoat Model: Jesus is a victim of human violence and sin. His death on the cross reveals humanity's propensity to violence and overcomes it by submitting to it.

Solidarity Model: Jesus died in solidarity with us, he underwent the ultimate consequences of living in a sinful world, in order to demonstrate the depths of God's love and God's desire to save us.
